"The result of the Standard work is better but there are still weak points which require attention. The Reading for example is deficient in expression and intelligence, and both spelling in the Fourth Standard and punctuation in the 5th and 6th are poor. Grammar and Recitation is creditable. Geography is weak in the 3rd Standard, elsewhere it is fairly satisfactory. In and below the 3rd Standard, needlework, knitting excepted, is good. Above this, the results ought to be better. The surface draining of the playground should be attended to.

[Page 136] The water ought not to stand in pools after the heaviest rain. There must be no omission of date of birth in the Admission Register or of age in the Class Registers. The supply of books is not quite satisfactory and a globe is needed".

The Infants are fairly advanced in Reading and Number, but the Writing should be better. It is very desirable also that mechanical aids for working sums, the first division, should be dispensed with. The use of strokes and fingers is making mere counting take the place of mental work. I hope the special Infant teaching will received fuller development now that suitable Illustrations and Apparatus have been procured. They have not been obtained soon enough for use in the past year. Some Action Song should be prepared. The boys must be more fully instructed in needlework if the grant for them is to be allowed in future.

Mixed School. Mr. Smith ought to have help in teaching the Standards of this school. The Spelling, Handwriting, and Arithmetic of the upper Standard are very unsatisfactory. Reading throughout the school is much wanting in expression, and the slate writing of the first and second Standards requires more careful attention. The Arithmetic of the two lower Standards is the only redeeming feature in the examination. I hope

to find a great improvement next year. The Historical Readers in parts of the school are in a very dilapitated condition and should be immediately replaced. The fence separating the boy's and girl's yards must be restored. More accommodation for the cloaks and hats of the girls and infants must be provided at once. It is impossible to recommend the higher grant for discipline etc while the present slovenly arrangements for storing the infants clothes continue. The Registers must be tested at least one a quarter, at irregular intervals, and no omissions of dates of birth must be allowed in the Admissions Registers. A suitable account Book ought to be used.

Infants Class. The elementary subjects are taught with very creditable success. In the Object Lessons the attention, especially that of the younger children, must be more fully secured. At present this portion of the instruction does not appear to have interested the class, or to have been very profitable. The order is fairly satisfactory. The first few weeks the talking and noise was dreadful. Boys and girls clambered to their places any how - walking across the desks and seats and knocking down any one in their way. The latter is almost eradicated. The talking (especially in assembly at beginning and close of day) requires more time, but with time, drill and firmness, it will no doubt be conquered. B. Packham has an hour twice a week in school for lessons (Tuesday and Thursday).

1892 June Friday 3rd Attendance poor all week. No special reason - a few cases of sickness. Mrs. Foord absent today, very unwell - obliged to go to bed Thursday evening.

[Page 227] We have tried this week to commence afternoon school at 1.15 - but that and the walk home (the Manager not being able to find a decent house within 10 minutes walk from the school) has fairly knocked her up. Master held Standard I outside and though very much cramped for room, managed fairly with the help of his eldest son. The infants were thus left with B. Packham, who by the way is very little use yet either to Master or Mistress. She has no command over the smallest class and if asked to take a class in any oral lesson stands silently in front, either unable or unwilling.

1892 June Friday 10th Attendance good all week - Have promised to reward regular children, with a little treat one afternoon in the fields. Attendance Officer came in today. No report to give him. No absentees except through sickness. Holiday Monday being Whit Monday.

1892 June 17th [Page 228] Good attendance all week and according the prearrangement took the most regular children (excluding 12 who did not make the required number of attendances) into an adjoining field and with games, biscuits, sweets, buns and milk they spent a happy afternoon. This school has seldom before been rewarded for regular attendance, either in the shape or prizes or treats. The Managers have promised to secure prizes for the most regular children in each Standard at Christmas and also too for good conduct.

1892 June 24th Attendance very good this week. The vicar came in on Wednesday and gave a lesson in Scripture. Thursday was a very poor day - only 50 present in the morning and those very wet, so they were dismissed before 10. In the afternoon 58 present and as it was still wet, did not mark, but dismissed. Attendance Officer at 12. No report again.

1892 July Friday 1st [Page 229] Attendance fair this week. A few irregular children; names prepared for Attendance Officer but he did not call. Vicar came in on Wednesday - but did not give a lesson - remained during Scripture.

1892 July Friday 8th Fair attendance all the week - the work progressing fairly - the Reading is still rather monotonous chiefly in the lower Standards. Been working with Standards 2 and 3 in Arithmetic this

week. L. Lewis Standard 2 and M. Vitler 3, do not seem able to grasp rules at all - have given L. Lewis Standard 1 Arithmetic and that seems too much for her.

Notice from Department of B. Packham's failure and this afternoon she told Master she would leave at end of quarter (July 25).

Master intends bringing this son (15) forward as 2nd Year P.T. helping as Monitor now. Have still much difficulty with the talkativeness of children - especially at conclusion of lessons and assembly for prayers.

1892 July Monday 11th Hooe and District Election Day - Small school in morning - holiday afternoon.

[Page 230] Heavy fall of rain during dinnertime yet full school in afternoon. Had to send one boy home with west jacket (cotton). Gave whole school (from Standard 2) paper in Arithmetic morning and one in Dictation and Grammer afternoon. Poor result.

1892 Feb 15th Diocesan Examination. 95 present. Holiday in morning. Vicar away from home.

1892 March 18th Put Standard 4 into Div (sic) of money. Have given new Drawing Books to four of best boys so far, Drawing of Upper Standards has been in Exercise Books. This subject is beginning to show more care. At first most boys would dash off this drawing in a few minutes. Masters' son has been engaged as Monitor with view to being bound as Second Year P.T. Gave Second Standard another paper in Dictation with better results.

1892 July Thursday 21st Volunteer funeral this afternoon several children absent in consequence.

1892 July Friday 22nd Small school in morning smaller still in afternoon - took those present (afternoon) into field for afternoon, as a reward for regularity - absentees being irregular children. No Officer.

1892 July Monday 25th [Page 231] B. Packham (whose time expires today) absent all day. Mrs. Foord absent also - went to Eastbourne on Saturday and was unable to get back same day (5 miles from nearest station). Admitted new girl - Margery Lewis (5) who - like all other children admitted since present Master took charge - knows nothing.

1892 July Friday 28th Ninfield Mission Hall seaside trip yesterday thinned the school very much. 69 present in morning, several of these going in afternoon. A few asking to leave at 11.30, dismissed school at that time and cancelled attendances. Holiday in afternoon. Mr. Hayward came in this afternoon (4-5) cold not stay to count.

1892 Aug Monday 1st Bank Holiday. 75 present morning. Holiday in afternoon.

1892 Aug Tuesday 2nd Standard 1 (hitherto in Infant Room) out in large room - for two following reasons. First - Infant Room rendered insufferably stuffy and hot, with them. Second - Master requires help of P.T. with Standard - since B. Packham left Master has been single handed (in his room).

1892 Aug Friday 5th [Page 232] Frank, Fred, Harry and Clem Lewis all absent, helping father in fields. Ada Cord absent - same reason. C. Stubberfield in harvest field and C. Gander in pea field. These are all the

children (all boys) who are engaged in harvesting - hardly enough to warrant closing for vacation. This and last weeks attendances compare favourably with corresponding weeks of lat year and with less numbers of names on books. 1892 Oct Wednesday 7th 82 this morning and work progressing fairly. Took Standard 1 in Arithmetic this morning. During holidays, several repairs have been executed.

1892 Oct Wednesday 11th This day I counted the numbers of pupils present; and found that the Registers for the day had been accurately kept. Cuthbert Routh Manager

1892 Oct 14th Better school this week. 90 present yesterday. Mary Martin absent under doctor's orders. Certificate.

1892 Oct 21st Good attendance all week. H. Cornford gone to work, his sister says. Attendance Officer reports that Magistrates at Battle refused to convict in a case (H. Martin) where the boy was over 13. Accordingly W. Cornford who is over 13 can not be compelled to return to school.

1892 Oct 21 [Page 234] Vicar has visited twice this week. Mrs. Foord absent this morning, giving a sore throat a rest. A. Markwick fetched from school this morning - his mother had fallen down stairs and hurt her leg.

1892 Oct 25th Very wet morning - only 49 present. Better attendance in afternoon. 81 present.

1892 Oct 28th Very wet day - small school all day. Numbers present 56-58. W. Cornford present this week, his father told Master that he was only at work for a day.

Several absentees still, owing to coughs - some whooping coughs. A few with colds. Master met Attendance Officer last week, but he has not called at the school for returns once since the holidays.

1892 Oct Monday 31st Admitted two new girls. Featherstones.

1892 Nov Tuesday 1st Vicar visited school this afternoon and closed school with prayers.

1892 Nov 2nd [Page 235] Vicar this morning at 11.20 - gave scripture lesson.

1892 Nov 4th Fair school all week. No cases of irregularity for Attendance Officer. Two more girls absent this week through sickness and one girl with crushed fingers. N. Mitchell.

1892 Nov 11th Full school every day - numbers only once under 90 and then 89. Vicar has been in twice, yesterday and today. The class subjects make slow progress specially with the upper Standards.

1892 Nov 16th Vicar present 11.15 gave scripture lesson.

1892 Nov 17th Mrs. Foord absent this morning through indisposition.

1892 Nov 18th A. Markwick absent nearly all this week, to carry letters from Post Office. Attendances have been very irregular this week, the weather has partly caused this.

1892 Nov Friday 25th Vicar on Wednesday 10.40. Half holiday Tuesday. Nursing Class (1st). William and Edward Vitler both absent with bad throats - a touch of diphtheria, doctor says. Have, only this week, been able to show Standard 4 Reduction of money - so backward.

1892 Nov 29th [Page 236] I counted the pupils present this day and found the Registers had been correctly filled up.

Registers closed at 1.45.

1892 Dec Friday 9th [Page 237] Vicar visited the school twice this week - Wednesday morning for Scripture lesson and Thursday morning at 11.55. Mr. Hayward visited school yesterday afternoon. E. Pont absent with measles. Wet dark morning - only 74 present (12 infants). 80 in afternoon - lowest of the week.

1892 Dec Friday 16th [Page 239] Attendances low all the week - much sickness about, specially whooping cough and measles. Several fresh cases of latter this week - Featherstones and Martins.

1892 Dec Monday 19th Measles spreading rapidly - Master's son (H. Foord P.T. in this school) down with it and this necessitates Mrs. Foord's absence to nurse him. Three more cases broken out since last week. Annie Pont, Edith Harmer and David Morriss.

Sidney Pont fetched from school this afternoon to go for Doctor.

Vicar came in this morning and Master reported to him the state of matters. Master single handed all day. Infants and all.

1892 Dec 20th Tuesday Very small school this morning. 67. Six more cases of measles reported this morning and 5 with preliminary symptoms (absent). A few present have symptoms. Vicar has written to Medical Officer of health for permission to close the school.

[Page 240] At first malady confined to little ones, being precluded by whooping cough; but now it is attacking the elder children.

On account of the epidemic and Master being single handed, the Registers were marked as usual this morning (i.e. 9.45) and dismissed at 12. Half holiday for nursing class.

1892 Dec 21st School closed owing to epidemic (measles).

1893

1893 Jan Wednesday 18th I visited the school this afternoon, and checked registers by counting the numbers present which I found to correspond with the entries in the several registers and with the total register.

Cuthbert Routh

1893 Jan Friday 20th Re-opened with 41 children. A very snowy week. Very few Infants all the week. Two on Monday - highest number 11 on Friday. Attendances yesterday reached 60. Vicar came in the afternoon with new registers but they are not as ordered.

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Registers for 60 names have been sent instead of 30 as ordered; have been returned. Master's son has not returned to school since having the measles and will not probably return again - it has been deemed advisable to send him away for his health.

1893 Jan Tuesday 24th H. Foord (monitor) returned to duties. Mrs. Foord obliged to be absent this morning with a bad cold in her face. Vicar came in this afternoon.

1893 Jan Friday 27th Only 75 present. Vicar came in this afternoon. Stubberfield's baby buried at 3pm. Carried to the grave by eight girls - all school girls. Vicar came in on Wednesday afternoon. New Registers arrived yesterday.

1893 Feb Friday 3rd Fair attendance all the week - though several children still absent owing to sickness - this is specially the case in the Infants room. Drawing examination took place on Monday afternoon at 2 o/c (January 30). Attendance Officer called this noon with Quarterly Attendance Book.

1893 Feb Friday 10th [Page 242] Full school nearly all week, although a few still absent through sickness. Vicar came in this afternoon. G. Freeman, M. Vitler and Elizabeth Lewis returned to school this week: all three been absent since December 21st last.

1893 Feb Thursday 16th Drawing report to hand this day. "The award has been made in respect to Drawing is 'Good'". The examiner reports that in Standard IV work is very weak.

1893 Feb Friday 17th Funeral this afternoon. Small school in consequence. Fair attendance all the week. Attendance Officer has not called for Quarterly returned yet - though he called on the 3rd instant with the book - he did not ask for list of absentees or irregular children. If there had been any cases of gross irregularity they could not have been improved by him, not having the list. And when he did have list and made visits, he told parents that hey could keep children at home 2 or 3 times a week (this from a parent's own mouth).

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Master makes such an entry simply to show that the children have attended school without pressure and as Registers show - attendances, with a few exceptions, have been very fair indeed for a struggling country parish.

1893 Feb Wednesday 22nd School inspected by Reverend H. G. Alington and Mr. Emerson. 93 children present.

1893 Feb Friday 24th I, H. J. Foord, resign charge of this school today and beg to note that the Standard children were presented in the following subjects, with a preparation of only 34 weeks and many of them broken weeks, owing to weather and local matters.

Subjects. Music by note. Grammer. Recitation. (5 Standards)

<u>Infants</u> Recitation. Music (note). Musical Drill. Varied occupations (2). Sewing for girls.

Yesterday and today, I have reorganized the school placing the children according to their several capabilities - and, for guidance of my successor, I have filled in a duplicate of the Government Schedule with ciphers to indicate the children to remain in the same Standard, at least for the present.

1893 March 1st [Page 244] J. W. Phillips took charge of this school today. The morning being stormy only 30 children were present and these were sent home in the pm - so few were present that no school was held.

1893 March 2nd Attendance very poor in the morning and in the afternoon the children were sent home before time for closing register.

1893 March 6th Examined Standards III, IV and V. I found them all very backward. In Standard V there were four present and, as the result of a fairly easy test in Arithmetic out of a possible 16 correct sums there was but one child who got a single correct answer. The Composition of the same Standard was very poorly done. In Standard IV eight children were present and only one child succeeded in getting a single sum right.

[Page 245] The average number of mistakes in dictation (a fair test) was over 11 per child. In Standard III out of 16 children, 5 got 2 sums right, 5 one sum and 6 children had all their sums wrong. In dictation the mistakes were evenly distributed averaging 6 per child. Standard I and III appear very backward especially in reading.

In the afternoon the children were granted a holiday to enable the master to see to his furniture etc.

1893 March 9th Miss A. Phillips (Article 68) entered upon her duties as Infant and Sewing Mistress. I find that the Infants are very backward, some who should now come out into school scarcely knowing their letters. Thee are only two Infants under 5 years of age, a very small number compared with the number of the other scholars,

1893 March 13th Commenced a new Time Table and intend giving it a week or two's time.

1893 March 15th The vicar called in this morning and inquired as to attendance.

1893 March 17th Today I gave the Attendance Officer a list of absentees and irregular children. The attendance has been very good throughout the week.

1893 March 20th [Page 246] Received the Government Report on Saturday last, the following is a copy:

<u>Mixed School</u> "The spelling of he 2nd Standard in this school is weak, the Composition of the 5th Standard poor, and the Arithmetic throughout very unsatisfactory. Unless there is great improvement in the latter subject it will be necessary to recommend the issue of a warning next year. I am aware that the school has been lately closed under medical authority. This interruption of work may have been the cause of some inaccuracy, but the inability which I notice in many papers points undoubtedly either to bad teaching or o bad clarification. The Reading is on the whole fair. The instruction in English has been of no value as a means of developing intelligence. Te children are talkative. Better accommodation is required for hats and cloaks. The pathway to the girl's office must be improved. Singing by note is passed with a warning."

<u>Infants Class</u> "This class is reasonably well advanced in the elementary subjects. The object lessons are in may cases valueless for want of paper illustrations. The children are orderly and well drilled. Attention should be paid to this subject and to the deficiency of apparatus. The special attention of managers is requested to the enclosed Form 69."

The Staff on February 1st 1893 was as follows:-

1893 March 21st Commenced a new song (in two parts), but found the children very slow in picking it up. The attendance today is very good.

1893 March 22nd Gave 1st Class a writing lesson, also a lesson in Geography. The children have no elementary groundwork in the latter subject.

1893 March 24th The afternoon closed with small attendance, many of the children staying at home to help their parents principally for the purpose of gardening.

1893 March 27th Several children away gardening. Sent home Alive Willard, sick with "mumps", before closing of register (morning). I notice great improvement in writing of Standards I and II.

1893 March 29th [Page 248] Standard IV are now working multiplication of money and appear to be making good progress. Last evening there was a meeting of the Managers to whom I gave a requisition list. The Infants attendance has decreased slightly, owing to sickness.

1893 March 31st	Good Friday. Holiday all day.		
1893 April 3rd	Easter Monday. Holiday all day.		
1893 April 4th	Opened with poor attendance.		
1902 A meil 6th	Attendence still years near several shildren ewer ill. Standard IV sommeneed long		

1893 April 6th Attendance still very poor, several children away ill. Standard IV commenced long division, the Reading of Standard I, II, III is very weak and I find it will require special attention.

1893 April 7th I gave a list of irregular children to the Attendance Officer.

1893 April 10th Admitted Ernest Fuller, a boy 7 years of age in a few days, he knows nothing not even his letters.

1893 April 13th Children had a holiday in the afternoon to gather flowers for Mrs. Brand.

1893 April 14th Attendance Officer called and took list of irregulars.

1893 April 17th Admitted 3 children, all infants. Used Ajax Composition bands for Standard V for the first time, with fair success and gave Standard IV single lined exercise books in place of the double lined ones which they had been using.

1893 April 20th [Page 249] This afternoon I checked the numbers present, and found them to correspond accurately to the numbers previously registered. Cuthbert Routh

1893 April 24th Admitted 4 infants, hitherto the numbers of infants under 5 has been very small. Commenced Avoirdupois with Standard IV. Attendance very good.

1893 April 25th Heard the Infants sing a new action song and looked at the drawing of the boys. The drawing has hitherto been done on slates totally unfit for the purpose.

1893 April 27th Examined Standard II in Arithmetic and Reading. The latter subject is very weak, but Arithmetic is improving. Standard III are making progress with long division.

1893 May 1st [Page 250] Hooe Fair Day, also Wesleyan chapel Treat. As very few children came in the morning, these were sent home and holiday given for the day.

1893 May 3rd Baptist Chapel Anniversary, a few children away in consequence, several away with glass pox (sic).

1893 May 5th The attendance in Infant Department is slightly lower than normal. The new slates used by the infants have materially assisted in the improvement of their writing. Commenced a new Table (capacity) with Standard IV.

1893 May 6th Attendance Officer took list of absentees.

1893 May 9th Received from Science and Arithmetic Department "Circular Letter 95". Standard III commenced addition of money.

1893 May 11th Heard Infant Object Lesson.

1893 May 12th Attendance Officer took list of absentees.

1893 May 15th Admitted 2 infants, this Department is now filling up, the number on the books being 42.

1893 May 18th Hooe Club Day, a whole days holiday given.

1893 May 19th Opened school with very poor attendance, slightly better in afternoon.

1893 May 19th [Page 251] School broke up for a week's holiday Whit week. Mr. J. W. Phillips left today.

1893 May 24th I, Godfrey Wolfe, took charge of the school today with Mrs. Wolfe (Article 68), and G. G. Wolfe (paid Monitor) as Staff.

1893 May 29th Re-opened after Whitsun; 90 present morning and afternoon.

1893 May 30th Reverend C. Routh visited and gave a Scripture Lesson. Attendance very good. 199.

1893 June 2nd On the whole a fair week's work has been done. 48 children our of 188 on the Books were present the full number of times. The School Attendance Officer visited.

1893 June 7th Yesterday the Mistress gave the girls an examination in needlework, and the results was most disappointing. This morning (11am) I counted the numbers present, and found that the total corresponds accurately with the numbers previously registered. Cuthbert Routh.

1893 June 8th [Page 252] Yesterday the vicar visited, listened to the Scripture Lesson and tested the Registers.

1893 June 10th The materials for the girl's needlework have been obtained, and the Mistress has got fairly to work with the year's work - now over four months late. The attendance has been all that would be desired, the average being the highest on record, viz 98. 61 children out of 115 not absent once.

1893 June 12th	Transferred 4 children from Infants Class to Standard 1.
1893 June 13th	Men repaired School fences etc.
1893 June 15th	The vicar attended and brought notice of the Religious Inspection on July 10 at 10.30am.
1893 June 19th	A very good attendance again last week - 56 not being absent once.
1893 June 20th	Sent new Time Table and Lists to Her Majesty's Inspector for his approval.

1893 June 21st Vicar attendance and gave a Lesson in Scripture.

1893 June 23rd [Page 253] The Attendance Officer called and took the names of three children. Received Time Table etc back from Her Majesty's Inspector approved and signed.

The attendance has been again very high this week, 56 not missing once, being 80.9 per cent of the number on the books.

1893 June 26th Received the remainder of the needlework materials from Mrs. Hayward.

1893 June 28th Vicar visited and gave Scripture Lesson.

1893 June 29th School in charge of the Mistress and paid Monitor this morning, as Master was engaged at the Church repairing the instrument there. Holiday in afternoon for same reason.

1893 July 1st A very steady week, progress all round.

1893 July 5th Vicar visited and gave a Scripture Lesson.

1893 July 6th The Duke of York's wedding day. Lessons commenced at 9 o/c and school dismissed at 11.15 for the rest of the day.

1893 July 8th Another good week's work to report. Attendance very good, 59 not absent once. 20 of whom were Infants.

1893 July 10th [Page 254] Diocesan Inspection by the Reverend W. Walsh. The vicar present all the time. School closed rest of the day. There were 111 children present out of 114 on the Books. 21 cards of merit returned.

1893 July 12th Most of the children taken to the seaside in vans. School closed in consequence.

1893 July 13th Received the following Diocesan Report: -

"The children sung nicely. There have been several changed in the teaching staff since the last inspection. Mr. Wolfe, the present master, has evidently taught with much care during the short time he has been at Hooe."

1893 July 14th Mr. Hayward visited this morning re the Boy's Offices, and the vicar called in the afternoon and gave away the cards of merit mentioned above.

[Page 255] Although a broken week, good work has been done, and the attendance has been remarkably high. 71 were not absent once.

1893 July 19th The clockmaker repaired the school clock today. The Sanitary Inspector visited today, and found very general fault with the offices.

1893 July 21st Harvesting has caused he absence of many of the older children this week, otherwise the attendance has been good. 52 children not absent once. Arithmetic has received great attention this week. Received bottle of carbolic acid from Mr. Hayward for use in offices etc.

1893 July 24th Harvesting very general. Closed for the summer vacation, to re-open on September 4th.

1893 Sept 4th Hop-picking not being over, reopening postponed until the 11th.

1893 Sept 11th Only 19 children returned to school today. These sent home and school closed for another week.

1893 Sept 18th [Page 256] Re-opened after Summer Holidays. Only 50 present of which 20 were Infants. Admitted Percy Brooke, and re-admitted Tom Vitler.

1893 Sept 19th Mrs, Wolfe too unwell to attend School today. Re-admitted Albert Collins. The numbers have gone up to 67.

1893 Sept 20th There being a cricket match in the village today the registers were closed at 9 o/c and the morning attendance finished at 11. Registers were finally closed at 1130 and the afternoon attendance ended at 1.30.

1893 Sept 22nd Only a poor attendance - average 52.6 - all the week. Mrs. Wolfe absent through sickness. By no means a satisfactory week's work done.

1893 Sept 25th A very great improvement in the attendance, 91 present. Mrs. Wolfe returned to her duties, although not quite well.

1893 Sept 27th [Page 257] The vicar visited this morning. Half holiday this afternoon. Hooe and Ninfield Athletic Sports.

1893 Oct 4th The vicar visited today. The following children had a 'tea and treat' given to them for not missing an attendance during the last quarter: - Julia Moore, Lily Lewis, Samuel Baker, Basil Vitler, Edith Corke, Eliza Bryant, Ellen Fuller, Annie Pont.

1893 Oct 7th Found out that Ella Smith was suffering with scarlet fever. Stopped the other (3) members of her family from attending.

1893 Oct 13th The attendance is keeping steady and high. The Managers met at 7pm on Monday. The Sewing Mistress reports well of the needlework. Received a supply of fuel during the week.

1893 Oct 16th The offices have been cleansed since Friday. A very full attendance today.

1893 Oct 17th [Page 258] Master went home from school ill.

1893 Oct 20th Master away until this afternoon with rheumatism and inflammation of the bowels.

1893 Oct 27th Nothing of importance to note this week. A fair week's progress,

1893 Oct 30th This afternoon, 3pm, I checked the numbers previously registered and found them to accurately correspond to the number of pupils present. I also examined the casting-up of registers - and found no errors. Cuthbert Routh

1893 Nov 3rd The third school quarter ended today. Average for the year so far 87.8. School Attendance Officer called for the attendances for July!

1893 Nov 10th The vicar visited on 8th. Cold piercing winds have reduced the average a decimal point this week. Reading and Drawing have shown most improvement. The First and Second Standard girls have done so too. Infants now know all three of this action songs.

1893 Nov 17th [Page 259] Undoubtedly Arithmetic is showing signs of improvement. Snow has kept several away, yet the average is over 90 for the week. Two or three very well worked specimens of needlework have been executed this week. Have spent as much time as I could among the Infants this week. They are a bright little lot, and appear interested and happy in their work.

1893 Nov 21st Half holiday this afternoon to allow Mr. And Mrs. Wolfe to attend the wedding of one of their late Pupil Teachers.

1893 Nov 28th Having counted the number of pupils present this afternoon (3.30pm) I found this to correspond to the number previously registered. Cuthbert Routh.

1893 Nov 29th Afternoon school commenced at 1pm and concluded at 3.15 today, as the room was wanted for a concert.

1893 Nov 30th Received a hand-bell from Mr. Hayward - one of the Managers.

1893 Dec 6th [Page 260] The vicar visited and gave a Scripture Lesson this morning and two playgrounds have been re-laid with gravel.

1893 Dec 7th Much rain this morning - low attendance in consequence; recovered in the afternoon.

1893 Dec 8th Arithmetic if still improving, but much back work has yet to be made up. Reading is somewhat behind too, although writing is quite satisfactory.

1893 Dec 13th Very wet and stormy. 18 away in the upper room, and 13 away in the lower room in consequence.

1893 Dec 14th Received a parcel of School requisites from the National Society. The vicar visited yesterday morning.

1893 Dec 19th	Two visitors	called this	afternoon -	so dark we	were obliged t	o light lamps.

1893 Dec 20th Very severe storm, only 48 present. The rain coming in at all the windows, several of the casements being rotten, and all very leaky.

[Page 261] Yesterday the School Attendance Officer took the attendances for October!

1893 Dec 22nd The vicar visited yesterday afternoon bringing the Examination papers with him. Filled in and sent off Form 8. Broke up for the Xmas holidays.

1893 Dec 28th Returned to School today - but only a very poor attendance of children.

1894

1894 Jan 1st There are only 85 present although it is a glorious day. Special attention has been given to the Reading throughout lately, and it is certainly improving. The remaining garments of the Upper girls are (with the exception of 2 or 3) finished, and ready for Inspection.

1894 Jan 3rd	The numbers in both rooms much reduced by heavy fall of snow.	
1894 Jan 4th	Only 7 Infants present, and only 40 altogether, on account of the snow.	
1894 Jan 5th	Weather worse -only 1 Infant and 16 older children present.	
1894 Jan 9th	Mrs. Wolfe absent on account of illness at home.	

1894 Jan 10th [Page 262] Mrs. Wolfe returned to her duties. The vicar visited for his Scripture Lesson.

1894 Jan 11th I checked the numbers previously registered by the numbers actually present and found one little girl had not been registered (apparently through not answering audibly to her name). The Register number was therefore <u>one less</u> than that of pupils present.

Notice of Drawing Examination received viz: Wednesday January 24th at 10am.

1894 Jan 13th The offices distempered and the walls of the larger room swept.

1894 Jan 16th By the kindness of the Managers, a Tea and Xmas tree was given to about 40 of the children who had shown excellence in attendance, conduct and progress.

1894 Jan 17th A very wet morning - only 40 elder, and 13 younger children present.

1894 Jan 22nd Received notice of the Government Inspection -viz Tuesday February 20th at 2pm.

1894 Jan 24th [Page 263] Drawing Examination held three certificates presented for illness; otherwise all the boys present. The vicar present throughout the Examination.

1894 Jan 25th/26th Master away to attend this mother's funeral.

1894 Jan 31st School-year ended today with 102 children on the Books, and an average attendance for the year of 85.42. Of this, the Infants' average is 26.07. The School has been open but 401 times.

1894 Feb 2nd Received four new Class Registers on Wednesday afternoon (31st ult). Weather been much against good attendance lately, and many are still away sick.

1894 Feb 5th The walls of he Infant Room have been swept; and the paint cleaned throughout.

1894 Feb 7th The Master absent 50minutes this morning from 10.45, to attend Ash Wednesday Service at the Church.

1894 Feb 8th Half holiday this afternoon to allow of a Sunday School treat being held at the house of Mrs. Brand, one of the Managers.

1894 Feb 9th Rough weather this week has kept some of the younger ones away.

1894 Feb 12th [Page 264] Received the following Report from the Drawing Department:-

The portions of History which have been prepared, have on the whole been fairly mastered. The needlework is good. The conduct of the children has been satisfactory. Real progress is impossible in a school rather cramped in space, and deficient in proper cloak room accommodation, as well as suitable offices. Immediate attention is required to the deficiencies in the premises."

<u>Infant Class</u> "The Class is suitably instructed in the elementary subjects, but the children of the First division are rather backward in Reading. The object lessons have been fairly profitable. The supply of slates is deficient. The Singing is not sufficiently good to deserve the higher grant. Cloak room accommodation must be immediately supplied."

The walls of the school are reported to be below the thickness required by Rule 4(d) of Schedule VIII of the Code.

Suitable cloakroom accommodation must be at once provided (Article 85(a) of the Code). The offices must be properly lighted, and made to conform to the requirements of Rule 13(d) of Schedule VIII Article 85(a).

More desks and illustrations for object lessons are required for the Infants (Article 85(a)).

The long closure for alterations has no doubt been prejudicial to instruction, but I hope that a serious effort will now be made to produce efficiency. The Registers must be tested at least once a quarter.

<u>Infants Class</u> "The elementary instruction is very fairly good, but a more advanced Reading book is required in the First division, and writing should be taught to the Second division on slates ruled with three lines. The instruction of Object Lessons has been on the whole very fairly profitable, but some of the illustrations are not of sufficient size to aid in developing powers of observation."

[Page 298] The Registers must be tested by the Manager at least once a quarter, at irregular intervals, as required by para 6 of Appendix II of Instruction and Inspection.

Attention is directed to Article 85 (d) of the Code. L. E. Theobald is recognized under Article 68, and M. E. Wolfe is continued under that Article.

Harold Smith was again too late to school to be marked present.

I called this afternoon to test the Registers by the number of Pupils actually present. I found this had been done by another Manager this morning but on counting the pupils I found the numbers correctly registered. Cuthbert Routh, Correspondent

1895 July 18th Dick Card had two fits this morning (-epileptic, I believe). They caused the school work to be interrupted for 20 minutes.

1895 July 24th Five children to late to be marked present this morning (49.15). They come from a distance.

1895 July 26th The usual school was not held this morning, one fifth of the number of children on the books only being present.

1895 July 31st [Page 307] The vicar gave a Scripture Lesson this morning.

1895 Aug 5th Being Bank Holiday no school was held today.

1895 Aug 9th The School closed for the Midsummer Vacations.

1895 Sep 16th The School opened after five weeks holiday. Number present 18. Hop-picking is not yet finished.

1895 Sep 18th The vicar gave his Scripture Lesson this morning.

1895 Sep 20th The attendance this week has not been bad. Hop-picking etc. have kept most children away.

1895 Sep 25th The vicar gave his Scripture Lesson this morning.

1895 Oct 2nd The vicar gave his Scripture Lesson this morning.

1895 Oct 4th This week's attendance has been much better.

1895 Oct 11th Mrs. Newport was absent from school partly on Wednesday and Thursday because of the sickness of one of her little ones. On Friday being finer weather she took them to Hastings

1895 Oct 14th [Page 308] Admitted Henry John Lade ages nearly 8. I am sorry he is so very backward.

1895 Oct 16th I this morning numbered the pupils present and found that the numbers already registered were correct. Cuthbert Routh, Correspondent The vicar gave his Scripture Lesson this morning.

1895 Oct 23rd The vicar gave his Scripture Lesson this morning.

1895 Oct 24th Mrs. Newport was away from school this morning. Charles Ridel, our monitor, left school at 3.30 in the morning, having a sick headache.

1895 Oct 29th Several panes of glass were put in the school windows this morning. Some coal and coke and a billhook were received from Mr. Carden.

1895 Oct 30th [Page309] The vicar sent word he was unable to take the Scripture Lesson this morning because of an engagement elsewhere. An examination in Arithmetic in Stage I have a good increase on former results. It is however not above fair: and the work examined is the easiest portion of the Code requirements.

1895 Oct 31st Number of Scholars this morning was only 39 in consequence of heavy rains. Three children came to school at 2.5 – after closing of Registers.

1895 Nov 6th Mrs. Newport was away this morning in consequence of the servant-girl having gone home sick. The vicar gave his Scripture Lesson this morning.

1895 Nov 7th [Page 310] 8th, 12th and 13th. Mrs. Newport away on these mornings for same reason as on the 6th. We find we cannot avoid these absences because we cannot get the help we need.

1895 Nov 13th The vicar gave his Scripture Lesson this morning.

1895 Nov 22nd The past week's attendance has been very good. It is two years since such an average was produced.

1895 Nov 26th E. Cramp was marked absent when he was present (in mistake).

1895 Nov 27th I numbered the pupils present in forenoon; and I found that the Registers had been Cuthbert Routh, Manager

The vicar gave his Scripture Lesson as usual this afternoon.

1895 Nov 29th [Page 311] An examination in Arithmetic this morning resulted in 60° passes in the Stages. My greatest difficulty in this subject is the faulty knowledge of Tables. Since I have been here I have

had to endeavour to teach the whole of the Multiplication Tables to a number of the children alongside of the rules required by the Code.

In the subject of Reading I reckon a third of the children to be below the satisfactory standard.

Geography is very weak, mainly through lack of materials for teaching the subject.

I may as well note here that considerable trouble to me has been caused by the belief among many of the parents that last year the Inspector's Report credited the school as nearly the best in England and that in consequence the school was exempt from examinations.
