### **General**

This "document" comprises five letters. I don't know who were they were intended for but they were all signed by John James Newport (Clerk) and all dated 27th April, 1940.

Letter 1

This allows a sum of about £28, equal to a Rate of 4d. in the £ for the "Benefit of the Parish".

Note

Until the Rating and Valuation Act of 1925, the Clerk to the Parish Council was paid his salary out of the Poor Rate - not out of the Parish Council's Rents. From 1921 to January 1928, he received £25 a year as a Rating Officer and £15 as Clerk - that is £40 a year. The present Clerk received £98 yr. for more than three years (to April, 1931). In Jan. 1935 it was restored to the £15 it was in 1921. Last year, on the District Auditors suggestion, it was further increased to £16 to cover all travelling expenses.

Letter 3

The Hooe Central Sports Committee and the Hooe Parish Council

It is an advisable that the H. C. S. C. shall respect the duty of the H. P. C. to --

- (1) The Parish Meeting, to retain and maintain the Coronation Playing Field for the Parish of Hooe.
- (2) The National Playing Fields Association, to carry out their requirements as to its Layout and Equipment and Maintenance as a National Playing Field.

Suggested Agreement

- (1) The H. C. S. C. shall have the use of the Field Rent Free on the following CONDITIONS: --
  - (a) That they observe the requirements of the N. P. F. A. as to the Layout and Equipment of the Field.
  - (b) That they keep in good order and repair the hedges, fences, and gates.
  - (c) That they endeavour to preserve undamaged any & all equipment supplied by the H. P. C.
- (2) That the H. P. C. shall continue to play the Ties Annuity levied on the Field, provide new offences and gates when needed, keep in order the ditch along Longdown Lane and Mill Lane; also, shall provide a new Pavilion and Tennis Courts as soon as funds may be obtained

Letter 4

Parish Council Meetings, Feb 1926 to Jan 1928

April 15th, September 23rd, to November 10th 1927 -- an interval of 13 months, December 22nd 1927.

Mr Heath received £40 a yr plus Travelling Expnss outside the Parish.

And Extraordinary Meeting was held, 14th August 1924, to consider the Condition of the Parish Property. The Council left it to the Clerk to do with the best he could and and he did nothing. It fell to the lot of the present Clerk to do something -- that something involved the spending of £130 in four years, of which £87 was for labour.

First Charges upon the Receipts from Parish Property

It is only as that the First Charge upon the Receipts of the Parish Property is the sum required to Maintain the Property in Good Condition and to improve it.

As to the Lanes, this means keeping the road surface "crowned" and free from hollows (which allow puddles that soften and "rot") and "sided" (allowing the surface water to flow off freely) into the "grips". It meaningless, also, the keeping open of all "grips" that director water into the ditches, and the keeping

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open of the ditches. £15 a year should be allowed for labour for this work. It is a false economy to omit caring out this duty.

As to the Cottages, it is abundantly evident that the very best is the condition in which to maintain them.
