

Hooe National School Log Book – 1872-1883

1872

1872 Nov 18th [page 18] The children worked well in the Standards. The little children are making sure progress. Paid great attention to the 3rd Standard. Worked up back rules with the children. The vicar called and Miss Manning brought work for the children and examined their work.

1872 Nov 25 [page 19] Many children absent through bad weather. Taught two new musical pieces. Taught the children to work sums on paper. The 1st Class did well. Paid great attention to the girls. Especially those of the 3rd Standard.

The Revd. Vicar visited and Miss Chas. Manning examined the girls sewing.

1872 Dec 2 [page 19] The children were drilled in the Standards, especially I and II. Children progressing favourably. The vicar and his family called and expressed themselves highly pleased.

1872 Dec 9 [page 19] Much attention paid to the Standards. Miss Manning called to superintend the work. Not very good attendance - bad weather. The vicar called twice during the week.

1872 Dec 16 [page 19] The children were examined in Reading and much attention paid to it. The other subjects were taught. The school room was opened to Divine Service in Friday evening 4.30pm. Attendance small. The vicar and his family visited.

1872 Dec 23 [page 19] Broke up for Xmas holidays.

1872 Dec 30 [page 19] Paid great attention to the Standards. The children sang all the pieces that are prepared for examination. Progress satisfactory. The vicar visited twice during the week expressed himself satisfied with the children. Miss Manning called to see the girls sewing.

1873

1873 Jan 6th [page 20] The attendance was not so good this week. Weather bad. Admitted a new scholar. One of the children left the Dame's School and was re-entered into the school. All the children examined in Dictation. Results pretty good. Vicar as usual called twice to see the scholars. Miss Manning brought work for the girls.

1873 Jan 13th Much attention given to the Dictation on paper. Results pretty well. Reading in the lower cases much better. Attendance bad though the weather. Mr. Manning called and Miss Manning attended to examine the work done by the girls.

1873 Jan 20th The higher Standards were examined - results pretty fair. Attendance little better. Mr. Manning called and expressed himself highly pleased with the discipline the Misses Manning's called and examined the work.

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1873 Jan 27th [page 21] Worked well in the Standards. Prepared the children for examinations. Looked well to the Multiplication table, weights, and measures. The Revd. Vicar called four times and the young ladies examined the sewing.

1873 Jan 31st Examined well the little children; especially those to be presented to the Inspector.
5th February 1873 Wm. H. Crocker HMIA

1873 Feb 4th No school in the afternoon - the school was cleaned. Reorganized the school. Made a new Time Table and sent it to the Inspector to sign. Revd. Mr. Manning called and the Misses Manning's brought work.

1873 Feb 10th No change whatever from the Time Table. All Standards were working steadily. Commenced teaching a new tune. The Revd. Vicar called and expressed his pleasure at the discipline for the children. New work for the girls introduced this week.

1873 Feb 17th Attendance very bad. All Standards working steadily. Paid great attention to VI Standard especially to the letter writing. The vicar as usual called and Miss Manning examined the girls sewing.

1873 Mar 1st [page 22] M. L. Koe, H. M. I. called

1873 Feb 24th [page 23] The children were steadily working at the Standards. Average low. Wet during the whole week. The vicar called several times. And Miss Manning brought work for the girls.

1873 Mar 3rd [page 23] The children steadily working at the Standards. Taught the younger children Notation and Grammar. Higher Standards commenced Grammar and Geography for extra subjects. The vicar as usual called and expressed his opinion that we are progressing favourably. Miss Manning called to see about the work.

1873 Mar 10th [page 23] Received the Time Table signed on behalf of the Education Department in fulfilling the condition of the Section of the Elementary Education Act 1870 by R. L. Koe HMI

The children are steadily working from the Time Table. Very few children. Many absent bird tending. Miss Manning called to examine work.

1873 Mar 17th [page 23] Numbers very poor. The children are progressing steadily. Entered three children (infants).

1873 Mar 24th [page 23] Numbers improving. The children continue progressing steadily. Miss Manning called to examine work.

1873 Apr 1st The younger children were examined. Numbers improving. Miss Manning called. The vicar called as usual. Government Report for 1872 "I found a new Master in charge, so maintains very good order in the School, and seems likely to prove an efficient Teacher."

The offices are not sufficiently separated. Signed N. Manning. Vicar

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1873 Apr 8th [page 24] The children were examined in all the standards and found them making great progress. Holiday on Good Friday. The vicar called and his daughters brought work for the girls.

1873 Apr 14th The first call was well drilled in Arithmetic and show progress. The lower Standards worked well at Reading. The vicar called. The Miss Manning's superintended the girls' work.

1873 Apr 23rd The usual work for the school was transacted. Numbers improving. Taught a new song. The young ladies called to see the Governess about the work. The vicar called as usual.

1873 Apr 30th Entered a new scholar. Many children ill. Taught the Infants a song. The Girls were examined by themselves and found they ant more training. The vicar called as usual and Miss Manning brought knitting for the girls.

1873 May 6th [page 25] A half-holiday. The children of the school having gone to the Chapel Sunday School to take tea, The children steadily going on with the Standards. Gave Gallery Lessons to the infants and taught them a song. The vicar called and expressed his satisfaction. Miss Manning called several times to see the work.

1873 May 13th The Revd. P. J. Manning - Farsbey visited the school with the vicar and his family and was highly pleased with the singing and the order of the school. The usual work of the school was carried on.

1873 May 23rd Miss Manning called to superintend the sewing. The usual work of the school was carried on. Three new children were entered. Numbers increasing. The vicar called as usual.

1873 June 2nd The numbers are increasing. Children steadily improving. Entered three new children. One left for Scotland. The Miss Manning's called as usual.

1873 June 9th-16th [page 26] Look well after the whole school. Found the higher standards a little wanting in judgement. Gave them a lecture on the value of questioning when not understanding the lesson. The vicar called and spoke very kindly to a few of the children. Miss Manning brought work.

1873 June 23rd The numbers increasing fast. Present 76. The infants wee examined in Writing and Reading. The higher Standards well drilled in Arithmetic. The usual routine followed. The vicar called and Miss Manning brought work and examined the girls sewing.

1873 June 30th The numbers increasing. Present 86. The usual routine was followed. Miss Manning left a large quantity of work for the girls to do. The vicar called as usual.

1873 July 5th The attendance very good. The usual work of the school was carried on - the infants were taught a song. The vicar called and expressed his satisfaction at the progress of the school.

1873 July 12th [page 27] Taught the whole school a song. Examined the classes on paper and was quite satisfied. There is a manifest improvement. Good attendance. The vicar called as usual.

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1873 July 19th The usual routine of the school; a great number away haymaking. The Governors examined the girl sewing. The vicar called and expressed himself perfectly satisfied. He examined the Log Book.

1873 July 26th The numbers much better this week. The whole school was examined. The result not so favourable. The vicar called as usual.

1873 Aug 8th The usual routine of the school. The children were taught a new tune; the girls continue to progress steadily well with the sewing. Numbers increasing. The vicar called as usual.

1873 Aug 16th The school broke up for the Harvest Holidays. The vicar was present and examined the whole of the school; result satisfactory. The children were regaled with a handsome tea by Mr. Swanton one of the committee.

1873 Oct 17th [page 28] The school was reopened after the usual Harvest Holiday. The school was small owing to hop-picking not being finally over. The children were classed and the usual lessons commenced. There was no sewing owing to the absence of the girls. The vicar did not call this week owing to his illness

1873 Oct 24th [page 28] School full. The Dame's School is broken up and the children have returned back to the school. Present 100. Reorganization of the school to enter the children into the different standards. Sewing carried on by the ladies. Mrs. Woodcock being confined. The vicar called. The usual work. No change in the Routine of School.

1873 Oct 31st – Nov 7th All the Standards working quietly. No change in the cases. School increasing. Present 114. The vicar and his family called as usual.

1873 Nov 7th –14th [page 29] The First Standard was drilled in Mental Arithmetic. The Infants were taught a new song. All the school worked quietly and steadily the subjects for examination, No change from the Time Table. School quite full. Present 116. The vicar called and examined the Register. The Governess taught sewing.

1873 Nov 21st The higher Standard was examined in Dictation. Progress very good. The Infants were taught a song. Writing well looked after. Attendance not so good - 109. The vicar called and the ladies examined the sewing.

1873 Nov 28th The Reading in all the classes well looked after. Numbers not so large. Many ill with colds. The vicar called and examined the Registers. The usual routine followed. The ladies examined the work.

1873 Dec 5th The numbers continue to increase. The usual work of the Standards was steadily studied. The vicar called and the ladies looked after the work.

1873 Dec 5th-12th [page 30] The Schoolmaster went to Battersea College to be examined for a Certificate - consequently a week's holiday.

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1873 Dec 19th [page 30] Numbers very small. Severe illness with the whole school (Mumps). 40 present only. The usual lessons were given. No sewing. No girls present.

1873 Dec 26th [page 30] Xmas Holidays.

1874

1874 Jan 2nd [page 30] The First Standard was examined in Arithmetic. New song taught. The Infants were examined and the progress is improving. The vicar called and the ladies superintended the sewing.

1874 Jan 9th All the Standards were thoroughly drilled. The Spelling lessons carefully revised. The School is still suffering from the severe illness of many of the children. The vicar called.

1874 Jan 10th [page 31] A new song was taught to the children. All the Standards were examined in Arithmetic. Progress very slow. The Infants were drilled in Counting. Numbers pretty good. The Clergyman called and the young ladies examined the work. Entered two new scholars.

1874 Jan 16th-23rd The usual routine was followed. The children are progressing slowly. Mental Arithmetic taught. No singing on Wednesday. Teacher had sore throat. Sewing taught as usual. The vicar called and enquired about the Register.

1874 Jan 23rd-30th The First Standard was drilled in Notation. All the Middling School attendances good. The vicar called. And examined the register. The Ladies called to superintend the sewing.

1874 Feb 2nd-6th [page 32] The subjects for examination were carefully instructed. The 18 songs were sung. All the classes were thoroughly examined in Reading. The Time Table was disregarded for two days during the week on account of the ensuing visit of HMI. The sewing was well-looked into. The Ladies called to see that all was in readiness. The visit of the vicar with the papers to fill up for examinations.

1874 Feb 13th Wm. H. Crocker HMIA. Holiday in the afternoon.

1874 Feb 16th-20th The school was reorganized and the children moved into the different Standards. The Table (Time) was carefully studied during the week. George Carden the Monitor went to Hailsham to be examined previous to his apprentice.

1874 Feb 23rd-27th The children followed the usual routine. Entered 2 new scholars. The Girls were taught the usual needlework. The vicar and the Ladies called.

1874 Mar 2nd-6th [page 33] The children were well drilled in Arithmetic. There was no change whatever in the Time Table. A new tune was taught. Entered one new scholar. Total present this week 107. The vicar called and the ladies as usual attended to the sewing.

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1874 Mar 9th-16th The usual business of the School was carried on. Entered 2 new scholars. The attendance not quite so good on account of bad weather. The sewing classes well attended to. The vicar and ladies called to see the children.

1874 Mar 16th-20th The children of the VI Standard were taught to write letters - a draft was given which the children filled up. After which they composed for themselves. This plan was pretty well but no successful. The attendance good. Noticed a great want of Notation and Numeration. Will deviate from the Time Table for this purpose next week. The vicar called and the ladies attended as usual.

1874 Mar 23rd-27th [page 34] The Time Table was altered for teaching Numeration and Notation.

The Government Report: "The school is in a moderately efficient condition, Writing and Arithmetic not well taught. More attention should be paid to the infants. The offices have been improved.

G. Carden will be admitted if Mr. Woodcock obtains a certificate."

1874 Mar 30th-Apr 2nd No change in the Time Table. The children worked steadily on in the different Standards. The vicar called and informed, "That the Schoolmaster had passed a successful examination and was placed in the Third Division of the class list." The ladies visited.

1874 Apr 6th-10th [page 35] The attendance very good. No changes in the Time Table. George Carden commenced duties as Pupil Teacher and Mary Burt as Monitor. The vicar called: punished a boy for using bad language to a girl. The ladies visited. The usual business of the school was transacted. All the classes were well-drilled in Arithmetic. Writing was also carefully superintended. The vicar called as usual and the Young Ladies brought work for the girls.

1874 Apr 20th-24th The attendance not so large because of hop-tying. Mary Burt the Monitor was dismissed by orders of the Vicar. The usual business was carried on. The ladies called to superintend the sewing.

1874 Apr 27th-May 1st The usual attendance and application to studies. The Register was checked by the Managers.

George Carden was apprenticed and the papers signed. On May 1st, there was a half-holiday. The children attended the annual treat of the Methodist Chapel.

1874 May 4th-8th [page 36] The attendance better. The infants were taught counting as far as 20. Great attention was paid to the Arithmetic and Writing. The Ladies called to superintend the sewing and the vicar as usual called.

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1874 May 11th-15th The girls were taught cutting out frocks. All the Standards worked steadily. There was a holiday on Hooe Club Day. The bell was rung but no attendance. The vicar called as usual.

1874 May 18th-22nd The attendance not so great this week. Many of the elder children engaged hop-tying. The Time Table was followed out. Children quietly progressing. The vicar called as usual and the Ladies called to superintend the sewing.

1874 May 25th-29th The Standards were examined in Arithmetic. New Reading cards provided. All classes favourably progressing. The vicar called likewise Mr. Swanton one of the managers.

1874 June 1st-5th [page 37] The ladies called to superintend the sewing. The numbers not so large this week - many absent hop-tying. Entered 1 new scholar. One left for Hastings. A new song "Buttercups and Daisies" taught the infants. The school progressing steadily. The Pupil Teacher received Text Books to study from. The vicar called and the Ladies called to superintend.

1874 June 8th-12th The number not so large. One scholar left for Eastbourne. The children well drilled in Reading. The Rev. N. Manning called and examined all the Registers and found them in perfect order. The Ladies called to examine the sewing.

1874 June 15th-19th The numbers better. Entered one new scholar. The vicar called and the Miss Mannings sent work to the school.

1874 June 22nd-26th [page 38] The Manager Mr. Swanton with Miss Guy called to see the school. The vicar called and Miss Manning as usual likewise visited. The numbers were small. Gooseberry Gathering and Fruit Harvest prevented many from coming. The Quarterly Account was examined by the Managers of the School and found correct.

The school steadily progressing.

1874 June 29th The Register was examined by the Managers Jun 26th.

1874 June 29th-July 3rd The school steadily progressing. No change from the routine. The vicar called and Miss Manning inspected the sewing.

1874 July 6th-10th [page 39] The classes were examined in Dictation. Mental Arithmetic taught more especially this week. No change from the Time Table. The vicar called and Miss Manning superintended the sewing.

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1874 July 13th-17th The numbers in comparison with the attendance last year at this time shows a great increase. Singing was rehearsed twice during the week. The Writing carefully taught. Examined the younger children in Arithmetic and found a great improvement.

1874 July 20th-24th No change from the Time Table. All Standards carefully instructed and progressing favourably. The vicar called and Miss Manning superintended the sewing.

1874 July 27th-31st Dictation and Mental Arithmetic carefully examined. More attention required to the Reading in lower classes. The vicar called. The sewing was examined by Miss Manning.

1874 Aug 3rd-7th [page 40] Much improvement. All lessons carefully taught. No change in Time Table. The vicar called. The school broke up for the Harvest Holiday.

1874 Sept 25th The Third Quarter Attendance and all the books checked and examined.

1874 Sep 28th-Oct 2nd The school re-commenced on September 28th after the usual holidays and a good attendance during the whole of the week. The usual business carried on and due attention paid to the lessons given previous to holidays. The vicar called as usual and the Sewing was attended to by Miss Manning.

1874 Oct 6th-9th [page 41] Examined the children in Arithmetic with Arithmetic Tests Cards. Notation especially required in all classes. Much improvement in the school generally. The vicar called and Miss Manning saw the Governess about the sewing.

1874 Oct 12th-16th The usual routine followed. Progress satisfactory. The vicar called three times this week. The Pupil Teacher received permission to be absent one afternoon.

1874 Oct 19th-23rd Much improvement in Reading. Dictation examined. Progress satisfactory. The vicar called and Miss Rhoda Manning called to examine the sewing.

1874 Oct 26th-30th Taught two new songs. Examined the Infants. Quite satisfactory. Introduced Test Cards in Arithmetic to Standards II, III, and IV. The III Standard backward in Writing. The vicar called and expressed himself highly satisfied. Miss R. Manning superintended the sewing.

1874 Nov 2nd-6th [page 42] The Routine was carefully followed. Progress good. Two new songs taught. Mrs. Dodson with her friends called and saw their children at work. Work well attended to. The vicar called as usual.

1874 Nov 9th-13th Arithmetic carefully examined. Examination of the singing. The usual work. The vicar called.

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1874 Nov 16th-20th The usual work of the school. Progress satisfactory. Numbers large. Writing examined. The vicar called and Sewing was carefully attended to.

1874 Nov 22nd-27th The Routine was carefully followed - no deviation. All classes doing well. The vicar called.

1874 Nov 30th-Dec 4th The songs were rehearsed. School carefully studying for Examination. Sewing examined by Miss Manning. The vicar called.

1874 Dec 7th-11th [page 43] Notation and Numeration well taught this week. No change of Time Table. Received a letter from one of the Parents stating that the time for Arithmetic is too long. The vicar called.

1874 Dec 14th-18th The usual business of the school carried on the Ladies brought work for the girls. The vicar called and expressed himself satisfied with the progress of the children.

1874 Dec 21-25th [page 43] CHRISTMAS HOLIDAYS

1874 Dec 28th - 1875 Jan 1st The General duty of the school carried on. Preparation for examinations. The vicar called.

1875 Jan 5th The Sanitary Inspector called and examined the water closets and reported to the Managers that he was perfectly satisfied with everything connected with the buildings.

1875 Jan 8th [page 44] The usual progress. Singing rehearsals. The vicar called. The sewing was examined.

1875 Jan 11th-15th The Registers were examined by the Managers. Jan. 14th 1875.

The usual business of the school carried on, Progress satisfactory. The vicar called. Girls taught sewing as usual.

1875 Jan 18th-22nd The Pupil Teacher was taken ill and went home. He is very ill and not able to attend to his duty. Placed Monitors over some of the classes. The vicar called and informed the Pupil Teacher that his examination would take place Jan 30th at Hailsham.

1875 Jan 25th-29th [page 45] The usual business of the school carried on. Progress satisfactory. Girls taught cutting out. Quite successful. Received the papers to fill in for the examination. The Pupil Teacher is

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still ill and is visited by a Medical man. The vicar called. The young ladies called also. Placed monitors over some of the classes.

1875 Feb 1st The Pupil Teacher called this afternoon but he was too ill to remain.

1875 Feb 2nd He called again today for a short time - he is a little better.

1875 Feb 3rd The Pupil Teacher tried to do his duty this morning. He remained half an hour then he was obliged to leave through illness.

1875 Feb 5th Wm. H. Crocker HMIA

1875 Feb 8th-12th The Pupil Teacher recovered from his illness and commenced duties. The Committee of Ladies called and gave the work that had been made to the children as presents. The usual business carried on. The school reorganized.

1875 Feb 15th-19th [page 46] Mr. Martin the Sanitary Inspector called - everything in order. All classes steadily working. New work provided for the girls. The vicar called.

1875 Feb 22nd-26th The children were well drilled in all the lessons. The work was attended to. The vicar called. The Miss Manning likewise called.

1875 Mar 1st-5th The numbers low. Much illness among the children. The vicar called and Miss Rhoda Manning examined the sewing.

1875 Mar 9th The Government Report - "During the past year Mr. Woodcock has worked with much zeal and diligence and has effected a considerable improvement in the general condition of the school. Needlework in very good."

1875 Mar 15th-19th [page 47] The usual business of the school carried on. Progress satisfactory. The vicar called. Sewing attended to by the Misses Mannings. Entered two new scholars.

1875 Mar 22nd-26th The Standards were well attended to. Grammar and Geography taught. The sewing attended to. The vicar called. Examined the classes in Mental Arithmetic.

1875 Mar 29th-Apr 2nd Easter Holiday

1875 Apr 5th-9th Grammar and Geography taught to the III, IV, V, VI Standards. The II Standard requires more attention to Arithmetic. The routine was strictly carried out. Sewing taught and examined by Miss Manning. The vicar called.

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1875 Apr 12th-16th Arithmetic taught to the II Standard. The usual business of the school carried on. The sewing was well attended to. Taught music to Pupil Teacher.

1875 Apr 19th-23rd [page 48] Entered two children. Children well attended to. The routine was followed. All classes progressing satisfactory. The vicar called. Miss Manning brought sewing for the girls.

1875 Apr 26th-30th The Reading was examined. Progress good. The lower classes were examined. Progress good. The lower classes were examined in Arithmetic (tables not known). There was no change in the Time Table. New work brought for the girls. The vicar called.

The Registers were examined by the Managers. April 30th 1875.

1875 May 3rd-7th The usual business of the school carried on. Tables taught every day for a few minutes before 12 o/c. The vicar called.

1875 May 13th The 13th day of May being Hooe Fair Hunt Day there was no attendance at the school.

1875 May 10th-14th [page 49] The school progressing favourably. No change whatever in the routine. The Ladies called to examine the sewing. The vicar called.

1875 May 17th-21st The children are progressing favourably. No change in the routine. The Ladies attended to the sewing. The vicar called.

1875 May 24th-28th Thursday being Ninfield Club Day the Ninfield Chapel took the school children to Eastbourne. Consequently a holiday. The usual work in the school carried on the vicar called.

1875 May 31st-June 4th Entered three new children. A few absent hop-tying. All the school progressing favourably. The vicar called. The sewing was well attended to.

1875 June 7th-11th [page 50] A few children absent gathering fruit. All Standards progressing favourably. The vicar called. Sewing well attended to.

1875 June 14th-18th The Manager and church Warden Mr. Swanton examined the Register - all correct. The children steadily progressing. Miss Manning brought work for the children.

1875 June 21st-25th Numbers good. No change in the routine. Taught two new songs. The vicar called and the Committee of Ladies superintended the sewing.

1875 June 28th-July 2nd The Standards examined in Arithmetic. Progress little backward. No change in routine. The Rev. P. J. Manning visited the school with the Vicar and they expressed themselves highly pleased with the discipline and general progress of the children.

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1875 July 5th-9th [page 51] The Infants were examined and new songs taught to them. All the other children are quietly progressing in their studies. The vicar called. The Committee of Ladies called to see the sewing.

1875 July 12th-16th Numbers good. Saw many of the parents and impressed upon them the importance of sending their children regularly and on time. This is an excellent plan and succeeds well. The vicar called.

1875 July 19th-23rd The Sanitary Inspector called and reported all the outhouses clean, no complaint whatever. The children progressing. The Committee of Ladies called.

1875 July 26th-30th The usual business of the school carried on.

The Registers were examined by the Managers. July 30th 1875.

1875 Oct 25th-29th [page 53] The usual business of the school carried on. No change whatever in routine. Cutting out taught to the girls. Many of the Ladies Committee called. . Mrs. Dodson.

The percentage of passes in Elementary Subjects has advanced from 68 to 75. The Grant under Art. 19 (a) is recommended. The pieces of needle done on the day of inspection must be better on another occasion. The specimens of needlework and Knitting were satisfactory. The singing is improving.
